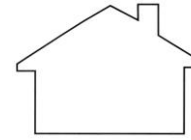


Spring 2 Values Victors!

At Home

To take your child's school learning about respect home, why not try the following:

- Lead by example. Make sure your children witness you treating others with respect.
- Play games (such as board games) which involve taking turns and being patient.
- Encourage your child to recycle their waste and look after our new Woodland Area.
- Praise your child when they take good care of their belongings and things around the house.
- Model manners and praise your child when they say 'please', 'thank you' and 'excuse me'.
- If your child is being disrespectful, talk about what happened once things are calm, and discuss what they need to do differently next time.
- Tell them that it's okay to feel angry and get things wrong, but that it's never too late to say sorry and learn from our mistakes.
